

Easy Infinity Scarf – Chain Loop Cowl with YouTube Help Video



Lots of layers and loops!

Notes:

- You can use either your fingers, or a Q size crochet hook to make the chain.
- You can use ruffle or ribbon yarn. If you choose this option, do not open the ruffle yarn to expose the holes. Just leave the yarn as-is and use it like regular yarn.
- You can use two strands of bulky or super bulky weight yarn held together while making the chain.
- You can use three strands of regular worsted weight yarn held together while making the chain.

Step #1: Leave about 6-8” of yarn at the end, then make a slipknot. Chain loosely until you crochet about 15 feet worth of chains.

Step #2: Once you have completed your chains, leave about 6-8” of yarn, and then cut your yarn. Pull the end through the loop to secure the final chain.

Step #3: Tie the beginning and final yarn ends together. Knot them tightly. Do not cut the yarn.

Step #4: Keeping the knotted end at the back, wrap the chain around and around until it forms a nice scarf. It is easier to wrap the chain around another person or a mannequin.

Step #5: Grab all the loops tightly at the back of the scarf, keeping the loops in place while removing the scarf from your model.

Step #6: Take the two yarn tail ends and position them in such a way as to encase the rest of the loops.

Materials:

- 1 ball of any brand of ruffle yarn

If you do not wish to use ruffle yarn, you can use 2 strands or bulky or super bulky weight yarn held together, or 3 strands of worsted weight yarn held together. You will need less than 100 yards for each strand of whatever optional yarn you choose to use.

- You can chain with your fingers, or use a Size Q (15.75 mm) crochet hook

- Optional button, pin or other decorative accessory and thread & needle for sewing on button.

- Scissors

Terms:

- **CH** = Chain

American English Crochet Terms

Step #7: Tie a knot around the loops to secure them in place. Weave in or tuck in your tail ends.

Step #8: Your scarf should be in one piece now – and the loops should not move if you have successfully tied your encasing knot tightly in the back.

Step #9: Add a decorative button, pin, or other accessory to your scarf.

Step #10: Wear or give as a gift – and enjoy!
