



Summer Jewels Scarf (Crochet)

with YouTube Help Video

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This is a nice lightweight scarf that can be used all year long. Since the scarf is made with just two basic crochet stitches – the chain and double crochet – it is great for beginners. The yarn used in the photo is 100% milk yarn. If you haven't worked with a bio synthetic yarn before, I highly recommend you try it! Milk yarn produces an incredibly soft fabric that drapes beautifully, while at the same time it is quite sturdy and strong. The beaded fringe adds a nice finished look to the scarf. Terminology:

CH = Chain	DC = Double Crochet	RPT = Repeat
SK = Skip	ST= Stitch	

Size/Gauge:

7" wide by 50" long, excluding fringe. 20 STs x 7 rows = 4" sq. (5 DC shell)

Materials:

325 yards DK yarn. Sample uses Kristin Omdahl Be So Baby yarn (each skein is 1.75 oz/560 g with 142 yd/130 m) in 4 colors: Diva, Splash, Turquoise, and Violet.

Sewing thread that matches the yarn color at the shorter edges of the scarf.

Size G – 4 mm or 4.25 mm crochet hook. Scissors. Yarn needle. Beading needle.

Beads. Sample uses the following: 48 purple 7 mm beads. 48 clear 5 mm faceted beads. 16 black AB 5 mm wide tube beads. 16 silver-lined 6/0 "E" beads.

Scarf:

CH 39.

ROW 1: SK 3 CHs (counts as 1 DC), 1 DC in next CH. RPT [CH 3, SK 3 CHs, 1 DC in next 2 CHs] across. Turn.

ROW 2: CH 3 (counts as 1 DC). RPT [5 DC in CH-3 SP] across. At the end, 1 DC in CH-3. Turn.

ROW 3: CH 3 (counts as 1 DC). 1 DC in next DC. RPT [CH 3, SK 3 DC, 1 DC in next 2 DC] across. Turn.

RPT ROWs 2-3 for a total of 85 rows, changing colors every 5 rows (if desired).

Once completed, fasten off and weave in all ends.

Beaded fringe:

Cut 100 inches of sewing thread. You may need more or less depending upon bead size, count, and desired fringe length. Thread a beading needle and ensure the thread is doubled. Tie and secure thread to bottom edge of scarf.

[Thread the beads. Sample scarf used: 1 purple, 1 clear, 1 purple, 1 clear, 1 purple, 1 clear, 1 tube, 1 "E" bead. Use the "E" bead as the anchor bead and skip over it. Use the needle to thread through the beads back to the edging. One beaded fringe has been completed. Whipstitch over to the middle of the next double crochet stitches.] Repeat between [] across. After the last fringe has been completed, make a few extra stitches onto the scarf to secure the fringe. Then weave the ends back through the beads of the last fringe and cut the thread. Repeat for the other tail end. Repeat the beaded fringe for the other edge of the scarf.
